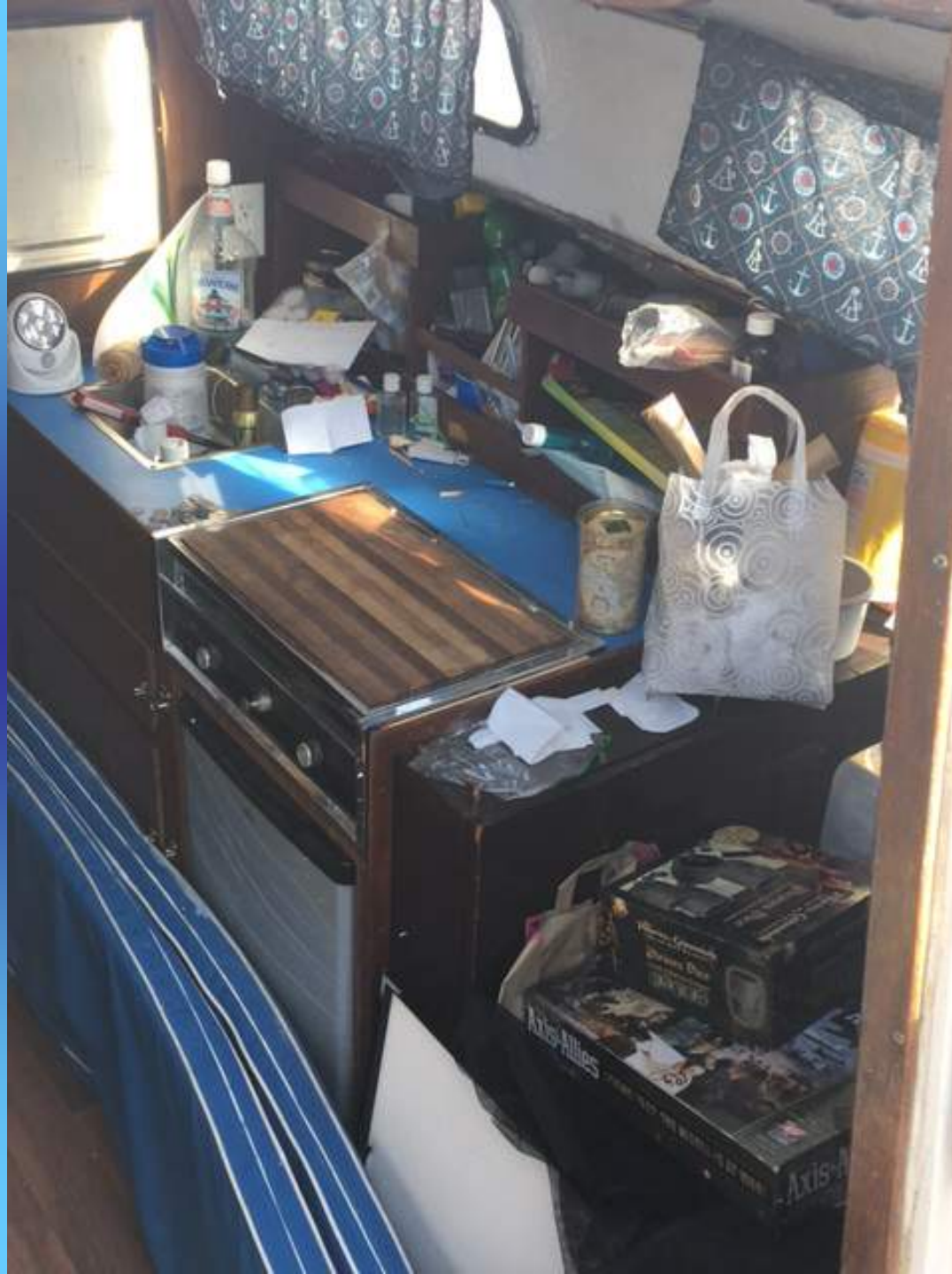

# Recent Accomplishments

- Restored 2006 Zodiac--new bright blue tubes and a new 150 HP Yamaha



- Purchased 2018 Everglades 24 foot center console--Replaced 2001 diesel hybrid



# Accomplishments Continued

- Secured a grant for 76K for a new efficient pump-out boat, cheaper to maintain, and more reliable.
- Used a 25K grant from DNR to remove 13 large derelict vessels, 2 derelict dinghies
- Evicted more than 10 people from city waters for repeated violations
- Increased revenue 11.4 %- a sum equal to almost 62K
- Stepped up enforcement efforts resulting in 100% compliance for regular sewage pump-outs for all live aboard boaters













# Secrets to Our Success



Implemented new ways to handle abandoned boats and habitual violators:

Warnings always have clear language including the violation, deadline to correct the violation, and consequence for non-compliance

Follow through with citations

Application for Criminal Charges

Crisis Intervention

Consent Orders

Banning
